We tap into the richest library of dramatic texts ever produced – the thousands of plays written in Spanish during the Siglo de Oro (some of them written in the New World) – to give today's citizens firsthand experience with how people in the 16th and 17th centuries wrestled with everyday

We work by connecting Florida's history with Spain's dramaturgy.

We research definitive events in La Florida's development by digging into historical chronicles, poring over archaeological artifacts. interviewing Spanish literature

unforgettable characters, dynamic situations, haunting themes, and eloquent questions that intersect with critical junctures in Florida's Spanish past. Using clear English peppered with extracts from the original Spanish, we translate those dramatic texts, and use what we've learned about Spanish La Florida to make them come alive in performance.

By taking our performances to places where members of the general public gather – to community festivals, senior centers, family days at museums, seasonal celebrations at public libraries, educational outreach programs, and flagship

Loco for Love: Cervantes v. Shakespeare in the Mystery of Cardenio October 2016 ⇒ present

Cervantes meets Shakespeare in a grudge match that's been 400 years in the making. The audience decides who wins the title of World Champion Storyteller, by comparing scenes from the two playwrights' different versions of the History of Cardenio. This is a 30-minute smackdown that ends in a cliffhanger, guaranteed to demand a sequel.

a delicious one-act satire about social status by Miguel de Cervantes Saavedra (first published 1615), showing a troupe of actors selling a show that "only people whose parents were married by a priest will be able to see"

a rollicking English-language premiere of a famous entremés by Franciso Bernardo de Quirós (first published 1658), relocated to Mission San Luis, the most famous Spanish Mission in colonial Apalachee Province.

Historic Indian/Spanish Wedding February 2015 - 2017

a dramatic reconstruction of a cross-cultural marriage between a groom who's a Spanish soldier and a bride who's a Native American in La Florida, c. 1703, featuring processions, a formal betrothal, highlights from a 1700s Catholic matrimonial mass, and wedding Fiesta with theater, song, dance, and food.

La gloria de España: Caught in the Crossfire, 1740 June 2014

5 actors from Spain, survivors of an attack by raiders from Georgia, use great monologs from *Siglo de Oro* plays to urge the citizens of St. Augustine to fight for their freedom

Juan del Encina's iCarnal fuera! March 2014

English-language premiere of a 1490s Carnaval play, by the "Father of Spanish theater," reuniting the play's original music with its dialog in a rehearsed reading

Florida-flavored translation of the oldest script that survives in Spanish, as it might have been performed during First Christmas celebrations by members of the De Soto expedition to La Florida in 1539-1540
